

AAROM Updates

ehcho AAROM has spent the last several months planning with communities for upcoming projects and gathering information on issues and concerns.

Travel also occurred, including the AAROM Coordinator and a delegation from Deh Gah Gotie First Nation attending the ILI Guardians Gathering to see what other groups were doing in their territories across the country.

The Deh Gah Gotie Guardians, Joe Lacorne and Stephen Nadli, participated in a panel discussion with the AAROM Coordinator.

This summer, each Dehcho community will again have an active Guardian program, patrolling and monitoring the waterways in each area. Each community has up to 2 Guardians trained and hired yearly to patrol their territories on the water, counting wildlife and birds and monitoring water quality.

- In addition to the Guardians, specific projects will occur, including the following: Dehcho AAROM will again be carrying out two fly-in sampling projects to collect data related to the varying levels of mercury in fish from Dehcho Lakes.
- In June, Heidi Swanson from the University of Waterloo will take a group of university students to Little Doctor Lake to conduct sampling



and a field course.

- In August, sampling will occur at either Reid Lake or Airport Lake, and local Guardians will be utilized for this work.
- In late August, Dehcho AAROM will be holding a fish camp at Ekali Lake in coordination with some research conducted by the University of Waterloo on the bioaccessibility of mercury from fish to humans. This study looks at how cooking methods decrease the amount of mercury that goes into a person from eating fish. This project will require hiring local Guardians, cooks, and cook's helpers from Jean Marie River.

- A second fish camp being planned for this year is the annual Deh Gah Gotie Fish Camp, which will take place closer to town this year for safety reasons. Funding is being applied for from a University of Alberta project called Aramat, and will incorporate an indigenous place-based names component. The fish camp will employ camp tenders, Guardians, camp cooks, cook's helpers, and elders from Deh Gah Gotie.
- Lastly, a recreational fishing survey project is being planned. A second boat to monitor the recreational fishery of Deh Gah Gotie is being sought. Funds have been applied for from DFO to have two new people hired to survey recreational anglers and count how many people are fishing and for how long. This crew will hopefully turn into a full-time second Guardian crew for DGGFN.

Some other agreements and projects for this year include:

- Collecting water samples for bluegreen algae,
- Carrying out sampling for ECC's community-based water program,
- Collecting samples of permafrost runoff for U of A,
- Assisting DFO with sampling on GSL
- Assisting with sampling to develop a NASA remote sensing tool with Boston University.

Negotiations Updates

y name is Michael M. Nadli and I am the Chief Negotiator for the Dehcho First Nations. I work on a contractual basis and I have been in this position since December 2020. I am bilingual in Dehcho Dene Zhatie and English. My past work experience include working as Dehcho MLA, Sub-Chief of the Deh Gah Got'ie First Nation, Intergovernmental Affairs Advisor, and former Dehcho Grand Chief. I own and operate my business Nadli & Associates Consulting. I live and work out of my home community of Fort Providence.

As part of the Dehcho Negotiations
Team, I work along with Negotiations
Administrator Leona Tanche, Language
Specialist Sharon Allen, Communications
Coordinator Bryan Strong, and Legal
Counsel Chris Reid. The Dehcho
Negotiations Team is a unit that Protect
and Uphold the Treaty Rights and
Aboriginal Title, and interests of the
Dehcho First Nations. We represent

Dehcho First Nations at the Main Table negotiations along with GNWT and Federal Negotiators. Our purpose is to achieve agreements on Self-Government and Lands and Resources. Our mission could be described as "Nahetsie Treaty 11 gondie duhdze senitsile", meaning we are putting the words of our ancestor's understanding of Treaty 11 into present day agreements.

The Dehcho Negotiations Team and negotiations is modeled after the Dene-Metis Land Claim process of the 1980's. Each of the five regions of the Dene Nation had a Chief Negotiator and team to work at a national level. Today, the Dehcho Chief Negotiator leads a team and works along with the Grand Chief, Leadership, Dehcho Assembly, and DFN organization. Negotiations is about talking and resolving conflict within a system among two or more parties. Key issues at the Dehcho Negotiating Main Table are described in the 21 Common Ground Principles of 1999; that Dehcho, GNWT, and Canada, disagree on the Ownership, Jurisdiction, and Sovereignty of the Dehcho First Nations traditional territory. This is at the heart of current negotiations on Self-Government and Lands and Resources.

Indigenous Language and Language Nests Proposals Due

As of July 2023, the Dehcho Self-Government Main Table negotiations are at an Agreement-in-Principle (AIP) stage, with the Rolling Draft AIP being seventy-five percent complete. The Dehcho along with the GNWT and Canada, are also part of the Land Use Planning Committee that are developing an Interim Dehcho Land Use Plan since 2001, which is about ninety-eight percent complete. The Agreement-in-Principle (AIP) was developed from the period of 2004 to 2014 with emphasis on Self-Government. The DFN Negotiations Team's focus for this year is to advance Lands and Resource matters such as the Interim Dehcho Land Use Plan, Dehcho Resource Management Authority, many of the big issues that were not addressed during pre-Devolution. We also want to achieve tentative agreements on furthering chapters of the AIP and establish Main Table working groups. We also plan on holding frequent Virtual Town Hall information sessions to provide negotiation reports and updates. Key timelines include the Land Use Planning Committee's objective of the approval and implementation of the Interim Dehcho Land Use Plan (IDLUP) and the next Federal Election by 2025. After an Agreement-in-Principle is supported and ratified, a Final Agreement is expected to be concluded within two years.

Planning and Strategy for Main Table negotiations is a critical function of the Dehcho Negotiations Team. It is important to prepare for each negotiating session by reviewing issues, interests and

positions, and determining appropriate strategies. For this to happen, the Dehcho Negotiations Team have frequent team meetings and discussion, connect through video conferences and calls, attend Think Tanks, and also report to the Grand Chief and Leadership. Most recently, the parties agreed to hold monthly negotiating sessions to March 31, 2024. Dehcho Negotiations Team have been push to ensure Main Table Negotiating sessions are held in Dehcho communities.

The next Main Table session is scheduled for August 14-16 and is virtual. Following is the Dehcho Self-Government Main Table Negotiations:

Expansion of the Health & Wellness Division

The Health & Wellness Division has expanded its team, now consisting of Health & Wellness Director Kristen Tanche, Regional Health & Wellness Programmer Karen Felker, and Regional On the Land Coordinator Britney Nadli. We also have several casual staff and contractors supporting our initiatives.

Guiding Statements

We have successfully delivered several on-the-land and healing programs, including a Follow-up Healing Program, Journey to my Best Self-Healing Program, Grief and Healing Program, the Dehcho K'ehodi Annual Gathering Youth Ecology and Traditional Knowledge Camp, and Yundaa Gogha. These programs have been lead by our dedicated staff, Karen Felker and Britney Nadli.

Upcoming Programs

Journey to my Best Self-Healing Program, an Elder's Healing Program, and the Youth Ecology and Traditional Knowledge Camp are in the planning stages or have already been advertised.

These programs promote culture, language learning, leadership skills, reconciliation, decolonization, well-being and more.

Health and Wellness Projects:

We continue to work with federal funds and projects to support the development of our vision, implement various initiatives and support community initiatives. We have received funds for mental wellness, a regional mobile wellness team, COVID-19, and we planning a regional Patient Advocate project and expanding midwifery and doula services in partnership with the Northern Birthwork Collective.

Language Initiatives:

Community Coordinators wish to promote language revitalization initiatives using the following activities in their community.

- Host evening classes using the language.

- Hire an Elder to visit the communities to teach youth on skill building skills at the community level.
- Create everyday spaces with labels in the workspace.

Planning

Communities lack the capacity to be able to carry out the task of creating community resources.

There will be continued workshops to ensure that language learning and transfer of knowledge will continue in communities. The workshops are meant to continue ongoing learning for Dehcho Dene.

Training Opportunities

These are ways that language learning can continue by community members to ensure that knowledge is being passed down to community members through community initiatives. Language Coordinators have been requested to be sent out for training in instruction and language development. CILLDI summer courses have been planned for the summer. There are plans for continued workshops later in the fall with Language experts to conduct training.

Community Update

Language programming in communities have been largely busy this year. Many programs have met the requirements for the Regional Language Plan. There have been community targets met such as cultural on-the-land programming, evening language classes, labeling, flash cards, and hiring translators to do programming. Some communities have collaborated with other programs in their

community; recreation, language justice, tourism, family learning and seniors. Radio announcements are translated at various times.

Promotional Items

This year the theme was Dene K'éé Gudeh Segha Nezu – Sichu Goghe Aht'i. I like to speak Dene. I am in. There are new promotional items at the office for pick up. We have mostly adult, youth, children and toddler sizing. There are limited sizes for the "Dene" t-shirts. We have also purchased Introduce yourself postcards. Edéhzhíe Updates

déhzhíe Regional Coordinator, along with the Community Coordinators and Guardians have been working steady since April. We started off the Fiscal year, with a group Travel to the protected area, with Global Philanthropic team via Snowmobile.

The group consisted of 8 Edéhzhíe guardians and 5 Global Philanthropic Staff. The Global team truly wants to thank the Dehcho First Nations for providing them with the incredible opportunity to meet with the staff and community firsthand. Getting the chance to meet everyone face to face, experience Edéhzhíe has given their team a better understanding of the project, and the importance of protecting this land for the Dene people as well as for the health of the planet.

The Edehzhie Staff were invited to attend the First Nations National Guardians Gathering in Ottawa. Nearly 350 Guardians, leaders, partners, and allies came together to learn and celebrate Guardianship. Edéhzhíe Regional Coordinator was asked to be a panelist to speak on the topic of Guardians and Wildfire in the Dehcho

"Guardians can play a critical role in strengthening Indigenous leadership in fire management and response. The Guardians in each region across Canada learn from examples of fire response training and communities' emergency response. But with that, we would all need to come together to put a action plan in place. This Spring we have seen and witness in the Dehcho, how fast a wildfire can spread, and what it can take from us. Its dangerous and we need to teach our younger generations what the meaning of Fire Smart is. Here in our Communities, out at our Cabins and just in general when boating and having a Picnic with our Families."

Cabins in the protected area:

• An exciting part of our work in Edéhzhíe is and around the locations of our operational cabin's that have been built within the boundaries of the Edéhzhíe. In order for us to fulfill the needs of the community in regard to the Indigenous Protected Area, infrastructure, such as cabins and trail development/maintenance is required. These cabin's will be used as a base for conducting research, monitoring and other Edéhzhíe work. Also, being useful to community land users!

Good job to Edéhzhíe Guardians and Community Coordinators!

Edehzhie Going Green:

- Winter 2023-24 we are collaborating with Gonezu Solar Energy to have solar panels installed to each of the 4 Cabins within the protected area. Gonezu Electricians will travel with the Guardians to their cabin's to complete the installation, train the Land Guardians on how to use and maintain the Solar and battery storage systems
- This Summer we have the guardians clearing and falling trees around their cabins. (Fire Smart)

"Remember to be sure your Fire is out!! "

River Monitoring/ Patrolling

- Edéhzhíe Guardian's have been patrolling the waters of Willow River and Horn River. These two rivers flow from the watershed of Edehzhie into the Mackenzie River.
- Deh Gah Got'ie Edéhzhie Guardians have been steady Patrolling the Boundary - stopping and checking to see if they knew that they were close to our newly established National wildlife Protected area. They also providing members with permit applications.

• Watch out for new signs this Fall. Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) has been working to get our signs for the 4 communities to have in place on the boundary lines of Edéhzhíe access routes. In the mean time, there has been heavy activity near the Fort Providence access – Deh Gah Got'ie Guardians made their own signs to put in the Edéhzhíe protected area to notify permit holders that they need to reach out to the Local Edéhzhíe Community Coordinator's.

Edehzhie Guardians main purpose is to protect the land, water, and air of Edehzhie and to Educate the people of Edehzhie.





Our Community Coordinators are here for you!!

That's why there always on the lookout for issues and observations from anyone. If you or someone you know noticed something, or hears a concern related to the Protected Area, we ask that you report it to one of our Community Coordinators or Regional Office Dehcho First Nations.

Some examples of issues that could be reported include:

- Non Section 35 rights holders
- Observations on changes to the environment (animal behaviour, habitat, etc.)
- Issues with hunting/trapping/ fishing/gathering

Working to have Edéhzhíe Cleaned:

The Elder harvester committee in each of the communities have showed and identified on maps of which lakes and shores that need to be cleaned up of Old Rusted Barrels. This needs to be taken out in order for us to maintain clean pure waters in the protected area of Edéhzhíe.

We had our first round of Community consultation in the community of Fort Providence. Jean Marie river and Fort providence merged together to Host a one day meeting with the elders from the two communities to work with Stantec to show which areas on the map that needs high attention.

Later this summer Fort Simpson and Wrigley will be scheduling one day meeting with Stantec staff, the Elders and Guardians to identify on maps where there is clean up need to be done.

The goals we are working with Edehzhie are:

- Protecting the land and waters and the animals
- Safeguarding these areas for future generations
- Be guided by our Elders every step of the way
- Ensuring that Dehcho Dene continue to use the land for Hunting, fishing, trapping, and gathering
- Supporting Dene Ahthit'e language when working together on the land.

Working with the School to bring Dene Knowledge to our Younger Generations:

LKFN Guardians collaborate with Liídlji Kúę Elementary School for a 5 day Spring Culture Camp. This camp was located by Martine River. The Guardians and Teachers worked together to mentor our youth in many different area's about monitoring birds, identifying animal tracks, traditional medicine, when to harvest and what to look out for, why we use them, also the big event daily was getting the camp site ready for the day and talk about protected lands in our region, and the impotence behind protection. What a great week that was for the Edehzhie Crew here in Fort Simpson.



Northwest Territories Project Finance for Permanence (NWT PFP)

"Centering the NWT PFP on Indigenous leadership and meaningful partnerships among all will ensure genuinely transformative outcomes for people, lands, and waters".

n December 2022, Trudeau's Government announced an \$800M commitment to support Indigenousled conservation and protect 30% of Canada's landmass by 2030. The funding will be negotiated over 2023, and available to participating communities across the Northwest Territories.

Dehcho First Nations (DFN) is continuing support for the implementation of the Northwest Territories Project Finance for Permanence (NWT PFP) for Dehcho communities. The NWT PFP is a new type of fund that will be available to Indigenous Governments territory-wide to support conservation activities. Communities who have chosen to participate will be eligible for

funding to support conservation-related activities such as starting up Guardians programs, supporting existing Guardians and protected areas, implementing support for wildlife and conservation area management and operations, and exploring community-based and regional economic development.

All communities in the Dehcho, excluding two, have submitted bilateral tools to be counted as participants in the process. The final signing ceremony for the NWT PFP will be held on August 25 2023, and a new name for the fund is being workshopped by those at the table. Stay tuned for more details!

Support for Dehcho Protected Areas

DFN is helping communities finalize planning for their Indigenous Protected Conserved Areas (IPCAs). Dehcho Protected Areas Communities (DPAC) are: Sambaa K'e First Nation, Ka'a'gee Tu First Nation, Tthets'ek'ehdelį First Nation and K'atł'odeeche First Nation.

In May, the group held a two-day legal workshop to explore pathways to protection, including different legislative tools and options for Dehcho IPCAs. These resources are available for communities with the permission of

the DPAC communities and was shared broadly amongst those communities who expressed interest in establishing protected areas.
